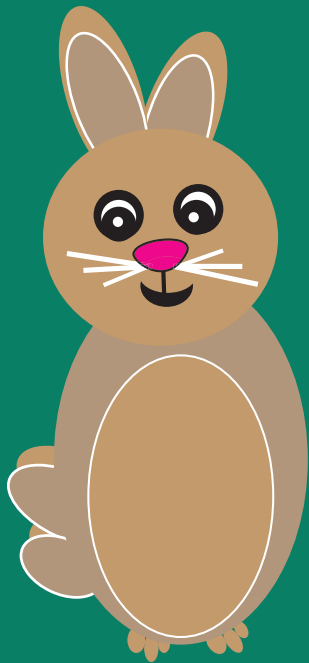

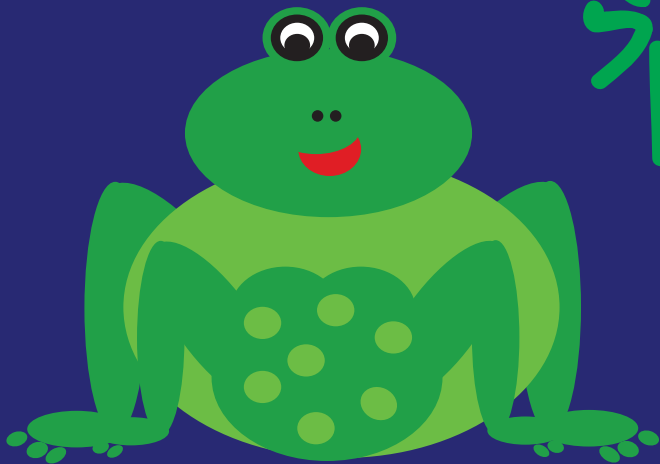

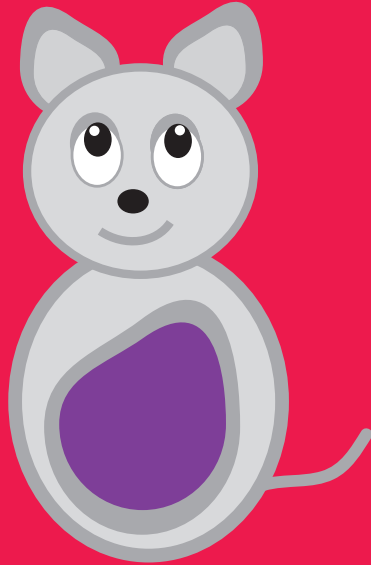
Panda (熊猫- xióngmao) - is a symbol of Man.
